My wife and I moved to Palmy from Auckland last year. We are familiar with having a "Council controlled organisation" manage water supply and treatment. My main concerns have to do with how water is going to be charged. I would want as much as possible of gathered revenue to be spent on the water infrastructure (as opposed to paying big salaries to the organisation's staff, especially at managerial level). For example, a few years ago the then CEO of Watercare resigned when his salary was made public. Secondly, Watercare increased water charges as a matter of course on the 1st of July every year, making water more and more unaffordable for Auckland residents. I would like to see increases in water charges only when and as needed. Water is absolutely essential to life and hygiene and should not be an expense beyond the ability for people to pay. Thirdly, on that note, in Auckland we were paying more for water going down the drain than the water coming into the home through the taps. Wastewater charges were about three times the price put on the water consumed. Also, we paid twice for both water supply and wastewater - once for the water actually consumed by the household (plus a charge for wastewater proportionate to the water consumed but at three times the price) and again in a daily fixed charge for water plus a daily fixed charge for wastewater. This was too much. Shouldn't one charge (that takes into account actual costs of water treatment and supply) be enough? Finally, I hope that the water management organisation would be fully accountable to Council and to the public for how it stewards the revenue gathered and for the amounts charged to residents. In terms of iwi involvement in decision making, I also hope that iwi would have an equal voice with the others that make up the governance and management of the organisation. PNCC Seniors Reference Group Local Waters Done Well Submission on Palmy Water Management Options 18 March 2025

The Seniors Reference Group have collectively discussed the options set out in the consultation documents produced by Palmerston North City Council. These documents gave three options all of which under legislation require the creation of a water organisation. We set our below our submission on this matter.

Preferred Option of the Group

Option 1, which proposes a water organisation jointly owned by PNCC, and Horowhenua, Manawatu and Kapiti District Councils.

Reasons for choosing this option

The following is a summary of the reasons outlined by members for the choice of Option 1:

- 1. The financial modelling set out in the documents identified that Option 1 was the best financial option for ratepayers.
- 2. The four councils are connected neighbours, and this proximity will add to the efficiency of the option.
- 3. With a collective population base of 223,000 residents there will be economies of scale for this combination of councils.
- 4. There are benefits in effective governance with a smaller number of aligned councils (in this case four).
- 5. Iwi in these areas have known relationships and it is expected this will facilitate constructive input going forward.
- 6. This option is legal and practical and will gain benefits from a focus on core business and an improved ability to attract key staff to the organisation.

It is acknowledged that several of these reasons also apply to Option 2 which was preferred by a minority of our members.

General Comments

The following matters were also raised in the discussion of the three options:

- 1. There is a great deal of uncertainty and unknowns around these issues. While this is understandable to some extent, the timeframe for moving forward is very short. These are critical decisions for our community, and we believe that an extended time frame for consultation and would provide better decision making on this subject.
- 2. We support the "long term lens" being used to make the organisation's decisions. There is a lot of uncertainty about how each council's regions will be charged for services provided in their area. It is obvious that Palmerston North is undergoing a costly

wastewater project right now. In the future other councils will be subject to similar projects as their consents expire.

Water meters

This matter is covered separately in the consultation document, and we are aware that it has been a sensitive topic for many Palmerston North residents in the past. Kapiti and parts of Horowhenua have already moved to meters. The possible installation of meters has been subject to public submission and some discussion in Palmerston North in the past. We are fortunate that water shortages have been few and far between over the years. This means that significant capital expenditure on additional reservoirs and dams has not been required in the medium to longer term. Water meters were in the past seen as a way of deferring the need to invest large amounts of ratepayers' money in such reservoirs and dams. This is because they are effective in reducing the demand, as illustrated when they were installed in Kapiti.

There have been other reasons mentioned for installing water meters, such as fairness between low and heavy users of water. However, the case for investment in meters should prioritise the financial effect on ratepayers. Accordingly, the comments in the consultation document that "at some point in the near future water meters will be likely" is of some concern. There should be some flexibility to ensure that such decisions are relevant to the differing needs of individual communities.

I have read you document regarding Palmy's water.

Option 1 does seem the most viable. However, my concern is with the inclusion of Kapiti Council. I lived there from 2007 to 2012 which was when they were looking at bringing in water meters. There is insufficient water retained for the number of properties in the area, which the Council continues to give building consents to. They have had a site purchased some years ago to build another reservoir - they chose not to do this (at the time it was going to cost around \$30 million, which will undoubtedly be far more than that now). This would have actually increased the amount of water available. Instead they chose to apply metering, which obviously is a huge revenue-gathering solution, that doesn't in fact produce any more actual usable water.

I am happy for PNCC to join with 3 other Councils, I would be happy if Kapiti was not one of them. They are part of the Wellington region in every other respect. It would surely make more sense for PNCC, Horowhenua, Manawatu and Rangitikei to join together for this option, we are all rural communities in the same region with strong ties already in place.

1. I'm concerned about the Shareholders organization that will sit at the top of this, set up a Board that does all the work, but then do nothing more than keep an eye on things. This seems an unnecessary layer of beaurocracy. And because it involves shareholders, that suggests to me that it is going to be ultimately concerned with making money that benefits their own pockets and those of shareholders, and doing water well and cheaper for it's communities won't be a high priority. Does this organisation have to be set up this way? Couldn't each local council contribute a couple of people each to "oversee the board's performance"? To be simple, people shouldn't be benefitting financially from doing this job, beyond the usual being paid a salary for the work they do.

2. Whenever these water organisations are set up across the country, all of them should get together to petition the government to pay for, say, a 50% share of the cost of setting up these new structures, since the government is legislating it. No pay, no progress.

3. I am presuming that waste water disposal is part of this water organisation's job? Although Nature Calls is expensive, it should be remembered that people chose this more expensive option because it was less polluting. I'm sure people still feel that way. Hopefully, the system chosen can be expanded and extended to all the areas to keep pollution down.

4. It wasn't clear in what I read who would own the pipes and infrastructure under the ground for water. It sounded like it might be the local council? If so, this seems unnecessarily confusing. This would mean both local council and the water organisation would be charging us rates for water. What should happen is that local council stops charging us for water because it is no longer handling it, and we get a reduction in rates. Then the water organisation charges us for water, and we pay that rate once and separately.

5. Please consider this now, and for the new organization in the future. Give people a discount on their rates if they design their house so that all water areas within the building are close together (kitchen, laundry, bathrooms etc) and very near the hot water cylinder or instant hot-water gas supply, so that water doesn't have to travel for ages through pipes until the hot water finally arrives. Or so that water doesn't travel across the ceiling (in a house with concrete floors) on a hot summer's day, and cold water arrives piping hot; then the water is run needs to be run a long time to get actual cold water. Or, give the discount to houses who upgrade their home so that water heating sources are directly outside or near rooms where water is used. (There are external water tanks that work on the same principal as heat pumps, and these could be easily retrofitted to houses.) This reduces energy usage and water wastage. 6. Give a reduction in rates or charges, to properties that have tanks to collect water off their roofs as an emergency supply, or to water gardens, or fill their pools, etc, and who have them fitted with the overflow thing that allows them to release water slowly if overfilled.

7. I did not like the idea of water meters, but now I see the wisdom (after a drop in visit) of people paying for their actual water use. I would support water meters. This incentivises people to be economical with water usage, and rates reductions for those practising water efficiency methods like those described in points 5 and 6 above would also contribute to good water practices and keeping costs down for all of us. And hopefully help us manage our environment as well as we are able.

This offers the most likely minimum cost and rent increase, while producing the economies of scale for (hopefully) more environmentally sustainable investments. We do note that many of the problems and benefits blend across the options.

We dislike the reduction in local democratic control and are concerned that this may be treated as the first step toward a more market-centric approach to water services. Please tell us what you like about this option	Maintaining the status quo through keeping local control over water is desirable. Especially as it minimises the risk of water being sold or otherwise transferred elsewhere for profit at the cost of local users. The ability to provide feedback and get fixes currently has a clear path for average residents to follow, which may become obfuscated and delayed when under am external body. We also prefer a situation in which water meters, or other water price consolidation, does not introduce an additional burden on renters. After all, renters use the local facilities and have a say in local democratic processes, even if it is the property owners living elsewhere that pay the rates bill. Regardless of the decision, it is likely that increased water costs will be used to justify rent increases.
Please tell us what you don't like about this option	Not being financially sustainable and potentially unlawful under the current system is problematic. That is a matter of Central Government determination however, and while we dislike being forced to make long-term decisions framed by short-term thinking, we recognise that the status quo was becoming increasingly untenable.
Which councils would you like to see Palmerston North work with for future water services?	Any council that is willing to work with PNCC is suitable. Working with neighbours is desirable to minimise costs, but as long as efficiencies of scale can be achieved to maintain a low water price burden on renters and maintain environmental sustainability, then that is the main thing.
Please share any other feedback you have about water service delivery in the future	We note that the solutions seem to be very similar to what would have been managed under the Three Waters scheme, but at a regional level rather than national. While we were generally supportive of the earlier scheme, to have it be rejected and replaced with one that feels to have less council and local democratic control is problematic. We recommend that there are strong controls to prevent the sale of water or waste treatment facilities. We also note that the current water utilities are increasingly aging and are already difficult to maintain and upgrade. While we suspect it is already the case, we recommend that there is consideration of civic engineers and labour distribution across the councils, bodies, and areas to prevent a significant increase in water price to reach a minimum appropriate maintenance schedule. Especially as noted in the consultation document that there are facilities elsewhere that are operating unconsented, as we (and renters) do not want those additional costs.
