

The services are unlikely to be more efficient for Palmerston North City in a widened environment, and Palmerston North has the scale adequatew to properly run these services (it has done so for decades). My perception is that the challenge of financial sustainability for PN residents is purely in the prioritising of major expenditure and in recent years inadequate priority to infrastructure. If that is addressed then the question of legal compliance is not an issue. PNCC needs to consider the interests of the ratepayers in the context of the overall costs to them if they face costs from a group entity and PNCC thinks it has achieved out of that, financial capacity to undertake other priorities. This option has the most credibility - it simply involves prioritising of finances.

I see no problem is resource sharing with the Councils in Option 1, but that does not require a separate entity for those Councils to shift financial burden. The payers are the same.

Why this is our preferred option?

Most affordable for our community - this option keeps costs down while ensuring reliable water services.

Long-term savings - residential ratepayers could pay around \$2,100 per year within 10 years, dropping to \$1,400 in 30 years. These numbers are at today's prices, so don't include inflation

Protects other council services – with water costs moving out of council, we can continue investing in transport, rubbish and recycling, parks, and community facilities - something we couldn't do under Option 3.

 Spreads costs across more people - 223,000 people across four areas and 71.000 water connections help share the cost of water services.

✓ Creates efficiencies – joint organisation means smarter bulk purchasing of pipes, vehicles, treatment chemicals, software, and back-office support.

> Lower costs per connection - more urban areas mean more water connections per kilometre of pipe helping to keep costs down.

Geographically close – just 1.5 hours travel time between all councils means faster response times for burst pipes or severe weather events.

Better investment potential with increased borrowing capacity and scale, this option can better invest in growth, climate change mitigation, and environmental management.

Stronger community ties – we already travel between these areas for work, family, and leisure. Palmy, Horowhenua, and Manawatū councils have strong working relationships, and we're building connections with Kāpiti.

More likely to happen – all these councils are planning to consult on this option, making it more viable than Option 2.

Easier to attract specialist staff – a larger organisation with scale and opportunities has a better chance of recruiting and retaining expert water staff.

This is not a popularity contest. There has been very little information shared on the state of water services in the other councils proposed as options. An environmental scan should be a mandatory part of this and appears to have deliberately been left out in favour of hyping up scale. This is a glaring omission and needs to be corrected to see where money needs to be spent and any timelines that are important in that.

PNCC have been very poor about improving resilience and mitigation toward floods in my area despite worsening climate and probability of increased rainfall. The queue is going to get longer. How will residents influence work? Accountability to those paying the bills does not appear to have been addressed with a labyrinth of bureaucrats to manoeuvre to get someone's ear and to get things done. How will PNCC represent my interests. What are the objectives of any new organisation i.e. provide water at no cost to residents within 10 years? What are the principles of this organisation? What quality measures are going to be in place? How much will rates decrease given PNCC will not be dealing with water? The cost of the new bureaucracy seems to be very high. Overall none of the proposals contain the level of information to ensure I would be comfortable endorsing them.

Feedback on PNCC Proposals for Palmy's Water in the Future

Overall I am disappointed in the proposals provided. They show a complete lack of detail and are ostensibly useless with no ability to analyse as a business proposition. There is a lack of analysis of the water services delivery model and its benefits and limitations or the detail around the projected benefits and risks of the new organisation. There is a lack of an environmental scan on each organisation the PNCC is proposing to partner with to show the value of their assets, what they are currently paying, what state the assets are in and how they are managed, what projects are planned, timelines, state of current regulatory compliance, current non compliance issues and how they are currently being addressed, etc

The objective of PNCC in this proposal seems to be compliance with Government rather than setting up a high performance organisation to deliver services. Analysis is lacking and benefits are couched around scale rather than other measures.

Organisational structure and governance are paid lip service – to be decided in future. Councils will put a couple of reps on a Committee?? Which will appoint a Board with specialist skills. The specialist skills should be known up front as the tendency to appoint unqualified local mates to Board positions is a sad fact of life. It would be useful to understand in advance detail on the proposed legal structure, the governance model, including Board composition and required expertise, and the relationship with the City Council and other stakeholders. Ratepayer inputs into flood mitigation measures, etc looks to introduce more hoops to jump around and to delay any action. At the moment it is vague and seems designed to market a solution rather than inform fully.

There is no detail on the transition between operational models and how it will be managed.

The financial information provided are difficult to comprehend without information on other entities PNCC are looking to partner with. Is there a level of debt that will be novated over to the new organisation from the start, what is the pricing strategy, how will new developments be funded.

Asset management information is sadly lacking. Current condition, lifespan and value of the current networks. Capital, maintenance and operational programs should have been identified in each entity and a preferred long term infrastructure strategy. PNCC is not an innovative organisation with little funding given to research and development that could be of benefit.

Risk for the new organisation have been glossed over with no risks identified, mitigation strategies or contingency plans. Throughout there is no mention of any safeguards to prevent privatisation in future, to prevent financial or operational failure, etc.

There is not any information on consultation that has taken place to date with those identified as key stakeholders. Where are the records of meetings? There is no plan for ongoing community and stakeholder engagement by PNCC or further communication on the hearings, information arising from the hearings, information arising from other Council hearings, common issues raised etc. and the need to provide further information. Information on the role the community input will play in the decision making process of the new water services entity is lacking. Overall this appears as though the Council has decided what it is going to do and consultation and hearings are a sham based on poor information and a timeline that cuts out the possibility for more detailed information to be provided and further consultation. Council attempting to bulldoze the community here, no attempt to provide a basis of trust in the new organisation, or to fully inform.

Performance metrics expected by the Council should be advised to residents. Reporting frameworks and input into strategy by the public should also be advised.

In setting up a new organisation there should be an environmental benefit. It is not apparent in this one.

Overall this proposal is weak and lacking in detail required to provide informed input. I cannot see how PNCC can claim to have consulted on such a weak document. Unfortunately this gives me no comfort that the new organisation will be able to deliver services at low cost, will be disciplined and accountable.
