

<u>Submission on Classifying Reserves - Under Reserves Act 1977</u>

We are pleased to support the Palmerston North City Council's intention to declare, classify and reclassify the reserves as listed in the public notice of Saturday 21 September 2024, thereby leading to the development of Management Plans.

We support

Schedule One: Land to be declared reserve and classified [Section 14(2)]

Schedule Two: Existing reserves to be classified [Section 16(1)]

Schedule Three: Reserve to be reclassified [Section 24(1)]

We note that some of the parks are given the incorrect suburb location.

Background

Since the mid 1980's, about 1984, we have made numerous submissions to the Palmerston North City Council advocating for the retention and protection of public green spaces. We are familiar with most but not all of the parks listed. Over these years we have continued to keep an ongoing interest in this matter. Bruce is a retired botanist.

In the past, funds were allocated in a previous PNCC Annual Plan to undertake the process of protecting Council parks under the Reserves Act 1977, and thereby leading to the development of Management Plans for these parks. We made numerous enquiries to Council staff as to progress on the matter, but as far as we can tell the matter was not progressed.

In the meantime, Council parks and reserves have been under continuing threat of being sold off or built on. An example of land under threat was the so-called 2013 Property Review which would have seen large numbers of parks or parts of parks being disposed of. Following a large amount of public opposition, the Council backed down, selling only some

shops and a small area of land (a former dog-dosing strip) in Linton. Former Council-owned bowling green club sites are currently being planned to be used for housing. Current examples of this loss of public space are the former Manawatu Bowling Club site (now called Huia Street Reserve) on the corner of Fitzherbert Avenue and Park Road, and the former Terrace End Bowling Club site (now known as 16 Summerhayes Street).

Other examples of Council-owned land under threat of being sold off in the past was the Linklater Block. Eventually, part of the now Linklater Reserve block was sold off. The now developed Edwards Pit Park was once promoted by a former Mayor as a racing car track.

Small local parks are constantly under threat of being sold off or built on. One of the arguments used by planners to diminish the impact of the loss of these small local parks and reserves is that "the land is under-utilised" and that "other parks are available nearby". Usually this "other land" is a sports field which does not equate with the land to be lost. It is not desirable to have a picnic in the middle of a large windy sports field.

Over the years, the character of one of our more iconic parks, the Victoria Esplanade Gardens and its environs, has been under threat, with more and more buildings being shoehorned on to the site. It has now reached its capacity for more "good ideas". We are aware that in the past the Esplanade did have a Management Plan, but the review of this Plan lapsed. As part of the Reserves Act 1977 these Management Plans require public consultation which must be reviewed. (Note the Esplanade has its own Act of Parliament.)

Citizens often think that Council-owned lands are protected as reserves when they are not. An example of this was the former Railway Land site on which The Warehouse is now located. Prior to the land being sold to The Warehouse the land was zoned Future Development Zone. In order to allow for the construction of The Warehouse to proceed this Western Railway Land site was rezoned to Outer Business, despite vast public opposition.

We need to protect our public green spaces for the benefit of future generations, as we have benefited from the vision of past generations who put land aside for public parks. We are all the losers if this land is lost. The Council's intention to Declare, Classify and Reclassify land under the Reserves Act 1977 brings certainty and clarity to the status of the public parks and reserves in Palmerston North.

A Reprint of Relevant Sections of Reserves Act 1977 – Including Sections 14.(2), 16(1), 24(1), and 41(1)

14 Local authority may declare land vested in it to be a reserve

(1)

Subject to this section, any local authority may by resolution declare any land vested in it to be a reserve within the meaning of this Act subject to any conditions specified in the resolution, to be held for any of the purposes specified in sections 17 to 23.

(2)

No such resolution shall be passed before the expiration of 1 month after notice of intention to pass the same and calling for objections thereto in writing has been published in 1 or more newspapers circulating in its district, and until it has considered all such objections received within that period:

provided that such a notice of intention shall not be necessary where a district plan makes provision for the use of the land as a reserve or the land is designated as a proposed reserve under an operative district plan under the Resource Management Act 1991.

16 Classification of reserves

(1)

To ensure the control, management, development, use, maintenance, and preservation of reserves for their appropriate purposes, the Minister shall, by notice in the *Gazette*, classify according to their principal or primary purpose, as defined in <u>sections 17 to 23</u>,—

all reserves existing immediately before the commencement of this Act:

(b)

all reserves created after the commencement of this Act,—

and for the purposes of this section, the Minister may classify part of a reserve for one purpose and the other part or parts of the same reserve for any other purpose or purposes: provided that, where a reserve is controlled or managed by an administering body, the Minister shall not classify the reserve under this subsection without consulting the administering body.

24 Change of classification or purpose or revocation of reserves

(1)

Subject to <u>section 13(2)</u>, where—

(a)

the Minister considers for any reason that a change of classification or purpose of the whole or part of any reserve is advisable or that the reservation of any land as a reserve should be revoked; or [Next page]

(b)

the local authority within whose district a reserve is situated or the administering body of any reserve notifies the Commissioner in writing that, pursuant to a resolution of the local authority or of the administering body, as the case may be, it considers for any reason, to be stated in the resolution, that the classification or purpose of the whole or part of the reserve should be changed to another classification or purpose, or that the reservation of the whole or part of the land as a reserve should be revoked,—

then, subject to the succeeding provisions of this section, the Minister may, in his or her discretion, by notice in the *Gazette*, change the classification or purpose of the whole or part of the reserve, which thereafter shall be held and administered for that changed classification or purpose, or revoke the reservation of the whole or part of the land as a reserve:

provided that the classification of any government purpose reserve for railway purposes shall not be changed and the reservation of the land or any part thereof as such a reserve shall not be revoked except with the consent of the Minister of Railways.

41 Management plans

(1)

The administering body shall, within 5 years after the date of its appointment or within 5 years after the commencement of this Act, whichever is the later, prepare and submit to the Minister for his or her approval a management plan for the reserve under its control, management, or administration.
